

From Middle Eastern Oil to Chinese Rare Earth Minerals— Where Does it End?

On September 7, 2010, a boat from the Japanese Navy and a Chinese fishing boat came into a run-in near an island that the two nations were negotiating ownership for. The Japanese took the fishing captain into custody, but while negotiating a release, the Chinese government did something unexpected. Instead of ordering papers and complying with the Japanese, China pulled out a weapon possibly stronger than guns, a threat to stop their mass exportation of rare earth minerals to Japan and the rest of the world.



The prisoner was returned immediately. China mines 93% of the worlds’ rare minerals. 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Recipe for peanut butter M&M cookies!

Ingredients:

- 1/2 cup of brown sugar
- 1/2 cup of white sugar
- 1 egg
- 1 1/2 teaspoons of vanilla
- 1 cup of flour
- 3/4 cup of baking soda
- 1 cup of M&Ms

2. Stir in the M&Ms by hand.
3. Make balls of the dough and place them on cookie sheets.
